# A 2004 Budget overview from MND

With Budget 2004, the Government is moving forward on its commitment to better equip the Canadian Forces as outlined in the recent Speech from the Throne.

Like all Canadians, the Government recognizes the important role that the Canadian Forces play in enhancing Canada's place in the world and ensuring the safety of Canadians.

Budget 2004 provides approximately \$1.6 billion in new funding over several years for National Defence and introduces plans to address the operational needs of the Canadian Forces, to modernize and acquire key capabilities and to enhance the quality of life of our members and their families. This includes \$1.3 billion investment over several years to accelerate the acquisition of new Fixed Wing Search and Rescue Aircraft and \$300 million over the next two years to support CF operations, including Afghanistan and Haiti.

This new funding is critical because it will address the financial pressures associated with operations and allow us to ensure funding is available for other priority areas in Defence and the Canadian Forces.

The Government is also providing an income tax exemption for Canadian Forces personnel serving their country on highrisk international missions.

The year ahead is a time of great opportunity for the Department and the Canadian Forces - indeed for the Government as a whole. The Government has set an ambitious agenda for this country which includes restoring Canada's place in the world, strengthening Canada's relationship with the United States and enhancing the safety and security of Canadians. Defence will be an important player in helping the Government achieve its objectives and implement its priorities.

As part of this effort, I am working with my colleagues from Foreign Affairs, Cooperation International International Trade to develop an integrated international policy framework. The ongoing defence review will identify Canada's defence priorities and the future capabilities of the Canadian Forces, and will provide a strategic plan to guide future funding decisions. It is important that we look at defence funding, and all our future planning, in the context of the ongoing

As Minister of National Defence, my priority is to ensure the Canadian Forces are prepared for the future. We face new threats, new adversaries and new demands and we must be prepared to respond. The Canadian Forces must transform if we want them to meet our country's domestic and international commitments, continue to operate with our allies and ensure that Canada can continue to make a meaningful contribution on the world stage.

Like all Canadians, I am keenly aware of the professionalism and dedication of the men and women of the Department and the Canadian Forces. I look forward to continuing to work with them as we prepare Defence for the future.

A major piece of Canadian Air Force history may soon find a permanent home at the RCAF Memorial Museum.

Officials with the museum are currently working closely with the Ecuadorian government to bring home what is believed to be the last remaining CC-106 Yukon. The aircraft was one of 12 primarily used for long-range transport in the 1960's and early 1970's.

Yukon number 932 flew between 1960-68 for 412 Squadron in Ottawa and then in 1968, it and a sister ship were moved to Trenton to fly with 437 Squadron. And that's where they ended their career," said Chris Colton, Museum Executive Director. "The reason this aircraft is unique, from a Canadian historical perspective, is that while it was in Ottawa with 412 Squadron, it was Canforce One. It flew the Queen, the Prime Minister and the Governor General. It was Canada's state airplane, so therefore it had a very noteworthy career."

After they were retired from military service, the 12 Yukons were sold to a private company which in turn sold them to various countries in South America. Number 932 became a civilian aircraft for Andes Airlines and continued to fly from 1974 to 1986. The aircraft eventually came under ownership of the Ecuadorian Government, which was in the process of selling it for scrap metal when the RCAF Museum stepped in.

"In November of last year I got an e-mail from the president of the North Star Aircraft Association. He had heard there was a Yukon that was in the process of being sold in Ecuador and thought we might be interested in learning about it, and possibly determine if we could get it," said

While attending the 100th anniversary celebration for powered flight in Ottawa, Colton met a long-time friend who was able to assist him.

"(My friend) works for an aviation company, Lockheed-Martin. I never realized that not only was he the company representative for Canada, but he was also the company representative for South America," stated Colton.

Through his friend, Colton was able to make some contacts in South America to help with his efforts to save the

"At about the same time I sent an e-mail to the (Canadian) embassy in Quito, Ecuador, explaining what I had heard and asking them to help me determine the status of the aircraft," said Colton. "Over the next 30 days a number of contacts were made both at the embassy and through the Lockheed-Martin representative, to the point where every other day I was getting e-mails from this friend of a friend who was making contacts for me at the airport and with the Government of Ecuador – specifically in the city of Guayaquil."

Around the 15th of January, the "friend of a friend" called Colton to offer his congratulations.





# Increased aircraft noise likely for Quinte area residents



# An MSDS Primer--what you need to know for safety

Do you know where to find the Material Safety Data Sheet for each chemical you work with? The information contained on an MSDS, as this document is also known, can save your life.

The MSDS tells you the hazards associated with a chemical. It tells you how to protect yourself when you use the chemical. It also says what to do in an emergency involving a chemical used or stored in your work area.

Your company is required to keep an MSDS for every chemical it uses. These data sheets must be kept

where you can reach them when you need them. That means they aren't supposed to be locked in an office you can't get into on the night shift or on a computer CD you don't know how to use.

If you aren't sure how to find a Material Safety Data Sheet, ask your supervisor. In many workplaces these documents are kept in binders at a chemical safety information station.

Now that you have located the MSDS, you need to read and understand the information on it. The contents are organized something like this:

# Basic Identification and Use

This section gives you the essential product information. You'll find the manufacturer's name, address and emergency telephone number. Make sure the product name on the MSDS matches the

product name on the label of the chemical container you are using. To make sure you have the most recent information, you'll also want to check the date the MSDS was prepared. This section also will include other names for the chemical, because many substances are known by a variety of names.

### Hazardous Ingredients

This section tells you about the ingredients in the chemical substance that can be harmful to you, and recommended exposure limits.

# Physical and Chemical Characteristics



This section gets down to the specifics of how a substance acts and reacts. Appearance, odor, boiling point, vapor pressure, vapor density, melting point, evaporation rate and water solubility are listed.

# First Aid, Fire, Spills and Leaks

This is the section you want to find quickly in an emergency. Flashpoint, fire and explosion hazards, preventive measures and firefighting equipment are detailed.

#### Reactivity

Some chemicals react violently to movement, water or other chemicals. This section will tell you if the chemical is unstable and under what conditions.

#### Health Hazards

Here you will learn how a chemical can enter the body through

This section gets inhalation, ingestion, wn to the specifics of skin contact, skin w a substance acts absorption or eye condreacts. Appearance, tact.

Health effects will be listed as acute (immediate), or chronic (long-term). The substance will be identified as an irritant, sensitizer, carcinogen (cancercausing) or reproductive hazard.

Symptoms of exposure will be included such as eye irritation, rashes and nausea.

#### Precautions for Safe Handling and Use

The personal protective equipment (PPE) required will be indicated. So will the need for ventilation, certain safe work and hygienic practices, including the washing and disposal of work clothes.

Locate the MSDS for any chemical you use, and get to know the contents. Highlight important parts so you can find them quickly again.


# **Rabbits...Not JUST for Easter**

Rabbits live approximately 4-8 years depending on their breed. While they are fairly low maintenance pets, they still have needs and a permanent, lifetime home is just the beginning.

Rabbits should have spacious, suitable housing, proper food and interaction and attention from the humans they live with. If you have more than one rabbit they should be of the same sex or "fixed" to avoid unwanted litters. (Two wild rabbits—a male and a femaleand their babies, can produce more then four million offspring in one year! REALLY.)

While rabbits have very strong back leg muscles, their bones are very fragile. Parents and children need to ensure they know how to properly handle a bunny to avoid painful injuries - a struggling bunny can break its own spine. Many rabbits can be trained to use a litter box but there is no way to tell which will learn this trick and which will not. Rabbit droppings accumulate very quickly and it is important to clean their cage regularly. Mom and Dad need to consider this before bringing Thumper home. If you are willing to put the effort in and can make a lifetime commitment, rabbits can be wonderful additions to the family.





# One on one interview with the Chief of the Air Staff

Lieutenant-General Ken Pennie, CAS, recently spoke with Air Force Editor Holly Bridges. Here are excerpts of that interview.

HOLLY BRIDGES: What are your first impressions of the organization now that you have visited most of the wings and deployed units?

CAS: Certainly I have seen the professionalism of our people out there and they're doing a tremendous job, but there's no doubt that we're fragile. Our financial situation has obviously put a lot of pressure on a lot of people and they're coping remarkably well. We have a good organization with a lot of excellent people committed to serving their country and committed to doing what they can with what they've got and that's one of the stories that needs to be reinforced. We're doing the best we can with what we

have.

HB: Is there anything that has surprised you?

CAS: The biggest thing I've probably noticed since coming back into the Air Force is the inability of the organization to have dealt with the consequences of the budget reductions in a more significant way. And that's something we're trying to resolve right now by following through on initiatives already in place, by establishing our doctrine, our vision, our future, where we're trying to go, what we're trying to be. We've put a lot of work into that transformation since I've been here.

HB: Yes, certainly we're in this period of tremendous change and transformation and you hear that almost on a daily basis at the headquarters level. When you get out to the wings, though, I think you would agree that the average member might not

describe the Air Force in a way that points to the future.

CAS: I understand the frustration that's out there. I go to wings and I see it, I hear it. But I think one has to look at the positive side. We have delivered. We've delivered Sea King dets, TAL dets, Op APOLLO, a whole list of things. Every capability the Air Force has, has been utilized somewhere in the world over the past few years. And we've done an excellent job. Notwithstanding all the pressures and how tough it is, we are delivering what the Government of Canada asks us to do. And we're not just doing it, we're doing it exceptionally well, perhaps too well, that's our biggest problem.

HB: I've heard you say that we're a victim of our own suc-

CAS: Yes. We do things so well it's hard to explain, on the other hand, why we need so many more resources. We know what we could do with more resources, we know how much easier it would be. In a larger context, when you cut an organization in half and double its operational tempo you have to anticipate some consequences. And we're now dealing with those consequences and doing what we can to aggressively try to fix them. And so now, and the CDS supports this, we are trying to aggressively address the quality of our operational life of our people and that's what Air Force transformation is all about. We are trying to find a way to address overall the quality of operational life of our people by making internal reallocations and that means making some tough choices. Nobody wants to have less of something, but

we've only got a fixed budget. So as an Air Force we have to determine how we want to address that. Basically we have to deal with the get Department, Department to accept or reject the list of what we come up with, and then go into the

Defence Review. It's no easy challenge when you have to make significant adjustments that could potentially effect

local communities. But I would say in a general sense we probably have more infrastructure than we need. This

ultimately will involve some infrastructure cuts. HB: Base closures, maybe?

CAS: The Defence Minister has said that no Canadian Forces bases will be closed. This is something that would require a government decision. But, we will look at anything that makes sense, anything that allows us to move to an operational posture where we can deliver similar capabilities albeit somewhat less, but to use the resources we have, to allocate so that we can achieve a better operational life. But it is more than just money. We are also looking at more efficient ways of doing things such as how we train. How many aircrafts do we need and what types? Where should they by based? How should they be equipped and manned? How do we deploy? Everything we do is being examined. The entire process we are going through is about redistribution of assets, not cuts. It's

ditionary concept? CAS: Yes, it's part of our concept, part of our vision. It's not actually delivering more than we've delivered. It means delivering what we're doing, but having a more systemic way of doing it. So any individual will know when they're in the window to deploy and when they're not in the window to deploy, so they'll know when to start their French language training, their professional development training and when they're going to be expected to deploy. The way I see organizing this is that people will spend a certain amount of time vulnerable to deploy if it's required and then will come off that posture and someone else will stand up. So we have a series of organized numbers of people who rotate through this deployability window in a systemic way so we're not doing it on an ad hoc way.

HB: What are your thoughts about strategic airlift? Can we, should we be the kind of Air Force down the road that can deploy if we're still only using the Hercules?

CAS: We can deploy effectively now using our Airbus and our Hercules and contracted aircraft. I think strategic airlift in Canada is something that needs to be better understood. I can't think of anywhere else in the world that is harder to support an operation in Afghanistan and we're doing it all by air—Airbus and Hercs—and we're doing it effectively. The first step toward moving forward is to replace those Hercules that are doing fixed wing search and rescue. That will allow us to replace those aircraft with presumably a twin-engine aircraft that has similar capabilities. Then we could retire

the oldest of the Hercs and take some pressure off the fleet. The second part is to replace the rest of the Hercules. We're going to use the same office and we're going to manage the two simultaneously. projects Actually there are three with the strategic air-to-air-refueling for the Airbus which is already out of the block. In terms of the Hercs, we haven't even defined the requirement yet, once we do that departmentally, get that approved and once that's nailed down, we can go fill that require-

HB: Given the challenges you've mentioned, given the transformation that's coming, how do you hope or intend to position the Air Force here at home and internationally?

CAS: My emphasis is on quality. It always has been. Our comparative advantage has always been our quality and so one of our biggest concerns is maintaining our quality. We are spending too much of our energy running the Air Force day to day and not enough focusing on the kind of Air Force we want to be. We're fixing that.

HB: In the meantime, what message would you like to pass along to members on where we are now and where we are

CAS: Stay the course. When I go out to any part of our operation and any time our senior leaders go out and visit our deployed operations and come back to Canada they are impressed with what we do. I think we're very highly respected. It's recognized we have some significant challenges to deal with and I think it's our job to work through those challenges to make the Air Force a better place.

# Are you, like me, a Real Estate junkie? No wonder





The prime rate, now at 4 per cent, will be 3.5 per cent within a few months. Variable rate, below-prime mortgages will be available for just a little over 2 per cent by mid-summer. It will be moment Canadian history when the cost of money will be

the lowest ever. Unbelievably, unexpectedly and historically cheap money will keep the real estate market in high gear for the rest of 2004, leading to even higher prices, bidding wars in demand neighbourhoods, record amounts of mortgage debt and an almost panicked attempt by many people to borrow sums that a decade ago would have terrified them. The times will be anything but normal.

This is part of the longer-term legacy of Nine Eleven, and also the spinoff of a war now raging between inflation and deflation. My money's on the latter.

That's one reason for my views on the Greater Fool theory of real estate articulated here last week - namely, these days will not last. Some people construed my comments as being negative on real estate in general, and a warning in specific not to be a buyer right now. No

In fact, I am a real estate junkie and have been such most of my life. I own my home, of course, along with a few commercial properties,

dence, of course, you can keep all of the capital gains generated when you sell, and pay not a cent in tax. This is the most significant tax break that most Canadians will ever receive.

And intense competition among the big mortgage lenders means borrowers have never been presented with such choice, flexibility, cooperation or insanely good deals as today. If you can still breathe, you can get a mortgage. The smart folks are staying with variable-rate mortgages which offer rock-bottom monthly payments, and the ability to lock in with just a phone call once rates start to rise.

Finally, what of real estate as an asset that will hold its value and reward those buying now? Well, long-term, there is no question that houses are investments. And, yes, Canada is extremely cheap when compared to the rest of the world. A house in Toronto or Vancouver, when set against its mate in Washington, Chicago or Miami is hugely affordable. When compared with similar digs in London or Paris, it's laughingly cheap. And lately we are not even keeping pace with property gains in place like southern New Zealand.

But that does not mean no danger exists for real estate purchasers. History is also strewn with the carcasses of investors who bought at the wrong time, for the wrong price and in the wrong place. I reflected on that in 1993 when I visited some apartments I owned and could not sell, since they cost more in taxes and monthly condo fees than they could command in rent. In that instance, even with no mortgage, I was in a negative cash flow situation.

So, just imagine if the market turns - if only for a few years - after mortgage rates inevitably rise and escalating prices have resulted in dwindling legions of buyers. All those who looked so clever taking on big mortgages at 3 per cent when houses are in demand could look like fools when mortgage payments double and real estate values head south.

If I'm wrong, house prices will go up forever and mortgages will stay at 2 per cent. And I'd love to be wrong. But just in



# **Budget 2004 - Defence Highlights**

Budget 2004 reflects the Government Canada's commitment to National Defence the Canadian Forces and ensures defence spending is aligned with the evolvpriorities Canadians.

The budget introduces plans to address the operational needs of the Canadian Forces, to modernize and acquire key capabilities and to enhance the quality of life of our members and their families. This includes:

--accelerating

delivery of modern Fixed Wing Search and Rescue (SAR) replace older Hercules aircraft and Canada's fleet of Buffalo aircraft by providing Defence new funds of \$300 million per year until this procurement is completed;

--\$300 million over the next two years to support CF operations;

--plans to move forward with the Joint Support Ship project;

--an income tax exemption for Canadian Forces personnel while serving on high-risk international tional missions; and --additional

resources required to cover the incremental costs of any future outof-country new deployments of Canada's mili-

This new funding is critical because it will address the financial pressures associated with operations and

allow us to ensure funding is available for other priority areas Defence and the Canadian Forces.

Although funds have been set aside, no final decision has been taken on CF's contribution to Afghanistan beyond August 2004.

In addition to these announcements, Government has already made some investments in major capital acquisitions to refurbish the Canadian Forces including: 66 Mobile Gun Systems to replace the aging Leopard tank fleet; the Maritime Helicopter Project, which will deliver 28 maritime helicopters; and Unmanned Aerial Vehicles and Counter Bombardment Radars, already in use by Canadian troops in Afghanistan and 800 Mercedes G-Wagons, 60 of which will replace Iltis vehicles already in combat.

The Government is not standing still and is addressing the urgent needs of the Canadian Forces until the review of Canada's international and defence policies is complete. The ongoing defence review will identify Canada's defence priorities and the future capabilities of the Canadian Forces, and will provide a strategic plan to guide future funding decisions. Final decisions await the results of the International Policy

Our goal is to deliver an affordable and sustainable defence program consistent with the Government's priorities while ensuring the Canadian Forces remain relevant to Canada's current and future defence and security obligations and objectives. Our efforts to effectively manage our resources will help us move towards operational sustainability in the short term and continue to move forward with the transformation of the Canadian Forces.
