## Franco-Phare plans to set up retail shop in Trenton

Quinte's only francophone community and non-profit organization held a press conference at the Quinte West Public Library on Tuesday to announce plans to set up shop in Trenton's retail district.

Franco-Phare recently received more than \$30,000 in funding from Trenval Business Development Corporation and Le Regroupment franco-ontarien de developpement economique et d'employabilite (RDEE) to conduct a market and feasibility study in regards to the commercial venture.

"This store would offer French language and cultural products to the Quinte area population at large, while actively promoting Francophone events and organizations. It would also encompass a "bistro" style venue whereby specialty coffees and varied other products will be featured," stated a news release issued by all three organizations involved.

"This initiative stems from our strategic plans which was published last January," said Jacques Dufort, President of Franco-Phare. "Through that plan, after months of public consultation, we created Franco-Phare...It's mission is to promote francophone-based initiatives in order to facilitate community, cultural and social-economical development."

The plan identified three main goals for the organization – establishing a French store, find a permanent location for Franco-Phare, and hire staff instead of relying solely on volunteers.

"An initiative like this has been long awaited by Quinte's Francophone community and Le Franco-Phare is happy to be at the forefront and delivering on some of the communities expectations," stated Dufort in the press release.

His enthusiasm was shared by both Bob Campney, Mayor of Quinte West, and Colonel Andre Deschamps, Commander of 8 Wing/CFB Trenton.

"We're pleased you're establishing a francophone store in this area. Quinte West is fortunate to have so many cultures. A variety of cultures benefits everyone, we should support them all and we will," said

Major Campney. "The francophone people in our area are well thought of, we get along well together thanks to the base and the sharing of facilities with each other. We're fortunate to have them."

"When Monsieur Dufort approached me a few months back with the concept of francophone group in Quinte West as a formal organization versus the informal arrangement that was in place, I was certainly enthused with the idea. The base has a large French population. Although we have activities on the base – we have the French language school and the resource centre – it tends to be localized or small groups that do their own thing.

"The idea of having an organization structured around the social-economic (aspect) is certainly interesting. There's enough population base to make it self-supporting. I do believe it will bring a sense of focus. Location is everything, hopefully they get a good spot with lots of visibility so people, whether they are francophone or not, can come in and ask questions. It brings a whole world of opportunities for

## 81 AEF running on a high tempo

As this fiscal year nears the end, the busy Beavers from 81 Airfield Engineering Flight are working at full speed on various projects on the Base here in Trenton. All year long, 81 AEF's work force, comprised of military carpenters, plumbers and electricians, were involved in many renovation and construction projects.

We started the year at a good pace, as we received a group of US Air National Guard engineers who were involved in constructions and renovations all over the Base, including the Junior Accommodation Building, Bldg 21, and the Hazmat Compound on Winnipeg Ave (north side). 81 AEF then focused on some in-house renovations and helping Habitat for Humanity in Belleville.

Recently, 81 AEF has started different upgrades throughout the Base. As of last November, early December, we opened up all the valves working on three main projects at the same time.


Our main priority right now is the retrofitting of the Warrant Officers' and Sergeants' Mess, where a complete face-lift is now required, and for that mission, 81 AEF has started stripping down the washroom facilities, the flooring, and some electrical lines and distribution panels rewiring.

Second in our priority is the completion of the Communication Loop Manholes on the north side and in the General Restricted Area (GRA). This project was started by the ANG last summer and stopped due to various reasons; we were given the go-ahead to resume work a few weeks ago. As it may seem strange to perform such work during the winter season, it is a viable solution as this underground loop is located in a particularly swampy or wet location, whereas heavy equipment vehicles and concrete mixers would not be able to reach that location during the sum-

Lastly, 81 AEF has also started the complete upgrade of the Heavy Equipment washrooms, located in B152 on the north side. The existing system was also so obsolete that major renovations are required. At this time, one half of the two washrooms has been upgraded, and we have started demolishing and upgrading the second half, which should be completed in the next few weeks.

As for the future, 81 AEF projects are on-going once more in CFS Alert, for the reconstruction of the fuel pipeline in between the Lower Tank Farm to the Upper Tank Farm. We also plan to redo the Peterborough Armoury roofing above the drill hall, reconstruct the Northern Lodge facility in Kaladar (North of Napanee), and construct a new Pyrotechnic Shed for 424 Squadron.



## **Arctic sovereignty patrol** to include air crash exercise

## Search & Rescue UPDATE



424 Squadron had a busy few days last week. It started on March 17 when our Herc was tasked, while out training, to investigate an overdue aircraft between Kitchener and St. Clair County International Airport in Michigan. The CC-130 crew searched the area until their crew day was finished, without any results. After a new Herc crew was called in, they were sent back to continue doing numerous search patterns using night vision equipment. The following day both our Cormorant and Herc continued the search for the missing aircraft. The Herc concentrated its efforts near Port Huron, Michigan, and the Cormorant was looking in the Kitchener area. After crew changes on both search aircraft, the search continued. Squadron personnel here in Trenton were gearing up to deploy a Search Headquarters with a Search Master. All the required people and equipment were gathered, loaded on an aircraft and sitting at the end of the runway awaiting clearance when the search was called off. The missing aircraft was located in a farmer's wood lot approximately 10 miles north of London. Unfortunately, the pilot did not survive the crash.

After that flurry of activity, the rest of the week was quiet. Until next week, stay safe



## This Week in **Contact**

1975 – Air Marshall Robert Leckie, CB, DSO, DSC, DFC, CD (Ret'd) of Ottawa, one of Canada's aviation pioneers, and the last surviving wartime RCAF Chief of the Air Staff, died at 84 years of age. Born on April 16, 1890 in Glasgow, Scotland, he arrived in Canada at the age of 16. In 1915, Air Marshall Leckie entered the Royal Naval Aviation Service as a pilot. He also played a vital role in the development of Canadian civil aviation when he organized and helped pilot the first trans-Canada flight. After returning to Britain in 1922, he served in various capacities, including flying from HM Ships Hermes and Courageous, two of Britain's early aircraft carriers.

1985 – Remote Call Forwarding (RCF) was introduced by Bell Canada to meet the growing needs of its customers. It was developed to serve out-of-town markets and to better serve businesses with an opportunity to establish a local presence in major Canadian and United States centres, without incurring the cost of establishing branch offices in those centres. At the time, the service involved the rental of a local telephone number in a target market, with numbers listed in both local white and yellow directory pages.

1995 – An annual survey that tracked and analyzed social trends in Canada showed results identifying three significant shifts in Canadians' attitudes, characterized by the rejection of authority, the desire for self-determination and concerns about personal security. Overall, the responses to the defence polling indicated a strong and growing core of support for the Canadian Forces, where overall 92 per cent of Canadians felt the Canadian Forces were doing a good job. Only seven per cent felt they were doing a poor job.

# Air Force Support Capability delivers key support to operations at home, abroad

WINNIPEG — In order to continue addressing the security needs of Canadians, both here at home and abroad, the Air Force is putting increased emphasis on becoming more expeditionary. The Air Force Support Capability (AFSC), is a part of that concept as it exits today.

"We may be good at being quick out the door, but what the Canadian Forces needs now is a sustainable expeditionary presence beyond ROTO 0."That is how Lieutenant-Colonel Russ Mann, project director for the AFSC project, sums up the challenge facing Canada's Air Force in describing an initiative that is "reinforcing a changing culture" in the Air Force.

The AFSC is about developing the right mix of deployable kit, personnel and training to support CF operations. The concept behind the AFSC is to

have support personnel who belong to a deployable unit or Mission Support Unit (MSU) for a fixed period of time. The intent is that each MSU would have one or two deployable teams of logistics, airfield engineers and CIS personnel and be situated where the deployable aircraft are based. The concept would see units adopt deliberate and disciplined training along with a predictable window of deployment that will see the team deploy as a unit.

"I think the AFSC can make a very positive impact and help people deploy with confidence," said LCol Mann.

When the AFSC team examined how domestic and international operations are supported by the Air Force, it identified the need for a more strategic approach.

"AF support personnel are often tasked in "ones" and "twos" and they are see-

ing new equipment in-theatre they have never seen before," said LCol Mann.

"Additionally, our flying squadrons and the Army have shown us that there is better rear party support for families of deployed members when they deploy as a unit or a team," he said. "The AFSC would apply this lesson to make ad hoc the exception, not the rule where our support personnel are concerned."

The AFSC received ministerial approval in 2003, and began to evolve shortly after with the creation of six, Air Boardapproved MSUs. The AFSC concept phase is now complete, and lessons learned on this project will be used to help define how the Air Force participates in integrated expeditionary force, as the CDS's Action Team defines what capabilities, force generation and command and control elements are required to meet Canada's defence needs.

## **ESDP service medal approved**

The Government of Canada has approved the acceptance and wearing of the European Security and Defence Policy (ESDP) service medal by CF members.

The European Union (EU) awards the ESDP service medal for 30 days continuous service on a designated EU-led crisis management operation. The medal is always awarded with a bar identifying the operation being recognized.

Bars have been created recognizing service on the European Union-led:

• Police mission (EUPM) in Bosnia,

since January 1, 2003;

- Military operation ARTEMIS in the Democratic Republic of Congo, from June 12 to September 1, 2003 (CF Operation CARAVAN);
- Military operation CONCORDIA in the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, from March 31 to December 15, 2003 (CF Op FUSION);
- Police mission PROXIMA in the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, from December 15, 2003, and;
- European Union Force (ALTHEA) in Bosnia-Herzegovina from December 2, 2004 (CF Op BOREAS).





## Could your house pull a "NORTEL

it's your Mone



His name is John, he's a real estate agent, and the guy tells me he has not had a listing in the past year for more than five days. Every time a house comes into his hands, it sells - in a couple of days, or a few hours.

"And the price doesn't matter, with mortgage rates at three per cent, there are always buyers," he says.

Indeed. A recent Royal Bank survey of home buying intentions found that one in eight Canadians plan on purchasing a house within the next year. Another poll found that over 80 per cent of people think real estate is a good investment right now, despite the fact prices have never been higher and affording a piece of it means taking on a honking big pile of mortgage debt.

In fact, numbers from across the western world show just about exactly the same thing - real estate is, right now, the investment asset of choice everywhere from Halifax to Washington to Toronto to Paris and London. Average folks are still suspicious of equity markets, down on mutual funds and mistrustful of anything they can't throw a little drywall on.

And hey, it's hard to argue the point, really. A house bought five years ago in a demand Toronto area like the one John works in has doubled in value in that time. The million-dollar threshold has been broken street after street after street in Canada's major urban Along markets. American eastern seaboard you can drop \$10 million U.S. on a reasonably nice country estate. Martha Stewart paid \$16 million for

Prices keep going up, of course, because the cost of money is no longer an impediment to buying. You can now rent a \$1 million home for \$5,300 a month. You can buy a house with no money down. If you have a pulse, congratulations, you qualify for financing.

With the prime rate at 4.25 per cent, and variable rate mortgages available in the three per cent range, houses remain affordable even as prices rise, and borrowers qualify for mortgage amounts that would have been just impossible a decade ago. Added to this heady mix is a war for market share among lenders who are more accommodating than ever. Because mortgages are considered "relationship" products by the big banks – leading to car loans, RESPs, GICs and RRSPs margins are sliced razor thin just to gain new customers.

Now, along come some party-pooping economists who are layering some respectability on a theory as yet unproven - that real estate values are probably unsustainable. One of them is Merrill Lynch's David Rosenberg, who has applied the same kind of yardstick commonly used to evaluate stock prices to house prices. The price of a piece of real estate is compared to the cash it could generate if rented, or what you could save in rent by owning that

The bad news is that, by this measure, house prices have hit an all-time high. The really bad news is that they are at about the same level the stock market achieved in 2000 - yeah, before it collapsed. Think houses, Rosenberg is suggesting, and think dot-com.

In fact, there is a valid point here – financial assets (which include real estate) have a certain value because of their ability to generate a certain level of income. The

price you pay for a neighbourhood plaza, for example, is directly related to the income it produces and the net return you'll get on your money. So, Rosenberg's calculation is that the cost of a house in North Vancouver, for example, should bear some relationship to what that house would rent for.

But, it doesn't. Investors everywhere are finding that real estate today is getting more expensive while rental accommodations are getting cheaper. While renters flock to become owners, landlords are cutting rents to cope with soaring vacancy rates. Just as a lot of Internet companies had sky-high stock prices, and yet no reasonable expectation of an operating profit, so today house prices – some economists warn – are out of whack with reality.

Does this mean a 1990sstyle real estate collapse? Of course not. Mortgage rates are not expected to rise for a long time, and then not by much. Governments are in surplus, inflation is in check, the economy is growing steadily and consumer confidence in real estate remains strong. So, no meltdown is likely. But, increasingly, neither are more big year-overyear increases.

Therefore, if you buy a home, make sure you like it and intend to live there for a number of years. If this is not the peak of the market, then it's just a click or two away.



games is not included in that number. Sleeping is the only activity that consumes more time for the average child, according to the Canadian Pediatric Society.

"Media can also play a role in the increasing rates of obesity through messages it sends," says Jennifer Ronan, a public health nurse with the Hastings & Prince Edward Counties Health Unit. The Health Unit is a member of the LifeWorks coalition.

"Children are exposed to aggressive ad campaigns for fast foods, candy and sugary cereals. Airbrushed images of thin stars distort our children's views of what a healthy body looks like. Kids need help to deal with the media world they live in."

## **Know your knees**

MediResource

Over half of all sports injuries involve the knee - not surprising, considering all the activities we do that need knee movements. Bone up on this large joint.

Your knee: it's the biggest joint in your body, made up of a lot of parts that can get injured in all kinds of sports. The knee connects the lower end of the thighbone (femur) to the upper end of the shinbone (tibia). Several large ligaments - strong, elastic bands of tissue that join bone to bone - make this connection, bracing and controlling the motion of the joint. The kneecap (patella) slides in a groove at the end of the thighbone; it protects the knee and gives leverage to various leg muscles. Cartilage at the ends of the leg bones helps to cushion the joint, like a shock absorber.

Sprains - stretched or torn ligaments - are an especially common knee injury; the anterior cruciate ligament (ACL) is the one most often damaged. This can happen, for example, when you change direction quickly, twist a leg or fall, slow down when running, or land from a jump. Typically, a torn ACL will be immediately disabling: you'll feel or hear a "pop," and the knee seems to "give way." Even though it might not be painful, see a doctor right away. Surgery may be necessary.

Knee pain can also come on gradually from overuse of the joint. For example, "patello-femoral syndrome," or pain caused by the kneecap being pushed against the sides of its groove, can occur if you do a lot of running. The pain, either sharp or dull, is usually felt in the front of the knee. Squatting or walking down stairs often makes it worse, and you might feel a grinding or "clicking" in the joint. A sports medicine specialist can help you to rebalance the kneecap and prevent further pain through proper training, stretching, and strengthening exercises.



## **Foreign-born Canadian Forces** dependants are Canadians

**CF** Personnel Newsletter From the Assistant Deputy Minister (Human Resources – Military)

In October 2002, Social Development Canada (SDC), formerly Resources Human Development Canada (HRDC), reduced the number of documents deemed as acceptable proof of identity during the application process for a Social Insurance Number (SIN). The "Certificate Registration of Birth Abroad" was one of the documents deemed no longer acceptable.

Fast forward: A CF dependant, born overseas, applies to change her SIN documents to reflect her married name. SDC does not accept her application because her "Certificate Registration of Birth Abroad" is no longer acceptable proof of her identity, and indicates that only a "Certificate of those to whom this latter

proof of identity for anyborn outside one Canada. This response causes the CF dependant in question to believe she is not a Canadian citizen.

In fact, she is a Canadian citizen. Without doubt, children born outside of Canada to deployed CF members are Canadian citizens.

After a review of this and other situations, SDC intends to reinstate "Certificate Registration of Birth Abroad" as acceptable proof of identity for CF dependants applying for Social Insurance Number (SIN).

The citizenship of CF dependants born overseas is not in doubt. However, CF dependants who were born abroad to a parent who was also born outside Canada may have to make formal application, before their 28th birthdays, to retain their Canadian citizen-



## Keep safety in mind when renovating

When it comes to any home renovation, there are many things to be considered, from the types of tools you will need to what type of wall coverings you are going to handle. When was the last time this room had a facelift? Could there be lead in the paint? How about new electrical outlets? Are there only a few things that have to be done, or should you consider hiring professionals to do the work?

With such a list of questions, you are probably thinking it would be much easier to forget it. But remember, when you renovate, it also

gives you the opportunity to fix potential hazards that may cause serious problems down the road.

Let's start with the most important question - "Can I do this renovation myself?" If you don't have the skill or expertise, hiring a reputable contractor could be the answer. Make sure your contractor is aware of all the latest regulations and has a clear picture of what you would like accomplished.

If you decide to do all or some of the renovations on your own, use good safety practices by keeping the following points in mind:

· Contract out jobs that require special knowledge, like electrical and plumbing.

· Be sure the tool you have in your hand is the right tool for the job. If you are not sure what hammer or what screwdriver should be used for a particular task, ask someone who knows. Always keep your tools

properly stored and and use recommended maintained.

· There is a constant danger of eye damage from using striking tools like hammers and chisels. Use the appropriate safety eyewear. Safety gloves should be considered for some jobs, and if you will be using power tools that cause high noise levels, wear hearing protection. The correct respiratory protection should also be used to protect you from dust and other airborne particles.

· Although lead is no longer used in house paint, some older paint can contain high levels. Find out when the room was last painted, and if you think any paint in your home may contain lead, have it tested. Consult a qualified professional if there is lead in your paint, as removal requires strict safety precautions.

· When you paint, be sure you read the labels on the paint cans before starting the job. Paint in a well-ventilated area,

Protective Personal Equipment. Keep heat and ignition sources and combustibles out of the area. Don't smoke while you are painting.

· Have electrical wiring professionally inspected to make sure it passes current safety codes. Outlets in wet areas such as bathrooms and kitchens must be protected by a Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI). These devices detect leakage of electricity and turn off the power before you can receive a shock.

It is important to keep safety in mind when doing any home renovation. Although the job may not be all that big, you are working with materials and tools that can harm you if they are not handled correctly. It may take a little while, but by following all the correct safety procedures while working steadily on your project, it will be worth the effort.
