Bomb kills Canadian Official, wounds three CF Soldiers

National Defence

OTTAWA - (January 15, 2006) One Canadian civilian official was killed and three Canadian soldiers were wounded after a bomb detonated close to their vehicle. The incident occurred around 1:30 p.m. local (4:00 a.m. ET), on January 15, about one km southeast of Camp Nathan Smith, the site of the Provincial Reconstruction Team (PRT) in Kandahar City. The incident took the life of Mr. Glyn Berry, a Political Director, from Foreign Affairs Canada embedded with the PRT. The family of the deceased and the soldiers' next of kin have been notified.

The wounded soldiers are Private William Edward Salikin, Corporal Jeffrey Bailey and Master Corporal Paul Franklin. All soldiers were deployed as part of the PRT

and originate from Land Force Western Area units.

All casualties were first evacuated from the incident site to Camp Nathan Smith by road in a military ambulance. A U.S. Army Blackhawk helicopter from Kandahar Airfield flew the wounded soldiers from the PRT site to the American field hospital at Kandahar Airfield where they are receiving medical attention. All three have received very serious injuries and their medical condition is unknown at this time.

The deceased and the wounded soldiers were patrolling in "G Wagon" (Gelaendenwagen) vehicles. Immediately after the explosion, the soldiers established a security cordon around their vehicles and the Provincial Reconstruction Team Quick

Une bombe explose en Afghanistan: un civil canadien a été tué et trois soldats canadiens ont subi des blessures

OTTAWA - (le 15 janvier 2) Un civil canadien a été tué et trois soldats canadiens ont subi des blessures lorsqu'une bombe a explosé près de leur véhicule. L'incident s'est produit vers 13 h 30, heure locale (4 h HNE), le 15 janvier, à approximativement un kilomètre au sud-est du camp Nathan Smith, le site de l'Équipe provinciale de reconstruction (ÉPR) situé à Kandahar City. M. Glyn Berry, un directeur politique d'Affaires étrangères Canada intégré avec l'ÉPR a été tué lors de l'explosion. On a avisé les plus proches parents des

Les militaires blessés sont le soldat William Edward Salikin, le caporal Jeffrey Bailey et le caporal-chef Paul Franklin. Tous étaient déployés au sein de l'ÉPR et proviennent d'unités originant du Secteur de l'Ouest de la force

Tous ont été initialement évacués du site de l'incident au camp Nathan Smith par route à bord d'une ambulance militaire. Un hélicoptère Blackhawk de l'armée des États-Unis basé à l'aérodrome de Kandahar a transporté les soldats blessés à l'hôpital de campagne américain établi à l'aérodrome de Kandahar, où ils reçoivent des soins. Les blessures subies par les

trois soldats sont considérées comme très sérieuses et l'état médical des militaires reste inconnu au moment où on se parle.

La personne décédée et les soldats blessés effectuaient une patrouille à bord de véhicules G-Wagen (Geländewagen). Reaction Force was dispatched to the scene of the blast. A detailed investigation is being conducted to determine the circumstances of the accident.

It's been a week of horrible, heroic and then happy news for the Canadian military.

I doubt highly that I was the only one in the DND community who cast a concerned eye on reports from the national press of the suicide bombing in Afghanistan (see story on page 1).

We all knew it was coming. We were all warned by the Chief of the Defense Staff when the focus of Afghanistan operations shifted to Kandahar. There were going to be more risks...there were going to be casualties.

For a nation not used to seeing their military in a combat situation, especially like the one found in Afghanistan, it was a frightening notion.

As news began trickling out about Sunday's attack, I felt instantly ill. Some media agencies were reporting that one soldier had been killed, while other's accurately reported that it was Canadian diplomat Glyn Berry.

Regardless, it was our people being targeted, and a nation mourned.

As the investigations began, word spread quickly about the heroic of Master efforts Corporal Paul Franklin, a Canadian Forces medic who, although seriously injured and missing a portion of his leg, tended to the other wounded until help could arrive.

He's a testament to the high level of commitment and training found among our personnel and is to be commended. Even in the darkest of hours, in the most difficult of circumstances, we get the job done.

As of press time, the news is decidedly better. A CF physician has been quoted as saying the three soldiers are expected to live. It's a tremendous relief, but also a harsh reminder that we may not be as lucky next time.

For now though, we can only be grateful for the lives of these three men, grieve for the one that was lost, respect the rest who are serving their country overseas, and pray for their safety.

Qualification in Borden. Congratulations also go out to newly promoted Cpl Hardy and Mansfield from the SOR.



An example of this our new CC150 Emergency Evacuation slide that is being added to enhance Aircrew Life Support Equipment training. On the AVS side of the house, we will soon begin our AHTZ CC-130 Hercules on-type avionics course. We have added compass swing theory and practical training that now extends the course to 63 training days and includes classroom based theory, multimedia, practical demonstrations aboard the Cockpit Mock-up Unit, and on-aircraft functionals.

That's all for now. Until then....On Wings of Fire.



Just in time: Some visionary stuff

it's your Money



I love elections. Hey, not just because I am a candidate in this one (fate to be determined on Monday), but because they force political parties to do the right things. You know, the visionary nation-building stuff they should have been

doing all along. For example, Liberals juiced up post-secondary students by promising that a new government of that stripe would pay half the cost of tuition in the first and last year of college or university. Nice. I like that. And the Conservatives say they will help small business operators by raising the income threshold before tax is payable, and drop the rate. Also nice – giving back money to invest in growth.

The Liberals say they'll raise the capital gains tax exemption for farmers and small business operators from \$500,000 to a million. That's perfect, because with the value of land and buildings steadily rising, these going concerns can be passed along within families more easily. And the Conservatives say they will eliminate all capital gains tax payable on cashed-in investments, so long as the money is reinvested within six months.

This is particularly sweet since it encourages investors to rebalance their portfolios, taking profits and not having them immediately decimated by tax. It pumps the capital markets, helps build the wealth of individual investors, assists people in saving for retirement and smoothes the way to where we should be going - the total elimination of this bone-headed and negative tax. But that's just my opinion.

In fact, this election has had a stunning amount to do with tax. The Liberals will cut tax brackets and raise the personal exemption. The Conservatives will chop two points off the GST. Liberals will drop the taxes on seniors by \$1.7 billion. Tories say their tax cuts for the plus-65 crowd equal more than \$2 billion. Both parties say they will keep their mitts off income

trusts. Both agree to improve the tax treatment of dividend income. Both are pro small-business. Conservatives will allow single-income families with kids to care for to income split. Liberals insist that lower income taxes benefit people while Conservatives say only the GST is a tax everyone can save on.

So, whatever the outcome on the 23rd, Canadians will be paying less money to Ottawa – billions less, in fact, for one of the biggest tax breaks on the country's history. And, as it turns out – just in the nick of time!

Why do I say this? Because we are exactly at that point in the economic cycle at which we need a tax boost. Consider:

- Thanks to stiff energy prices, an oil-rich country and a few other factors, the Canadian dollar has been rising in value for months and could soon touch the 90-cent U.S. mark. This may be nice if you spend half the year browning your buns in Arizona, but it is not good news for the manufacturing and exporting sectors, which will continue to be under pressure.

- Thanks to a 15% surge in government spending over the past year and a growing domestic economy, the Bank of Canada is likely to keep on jacking up the last word: Vote!

cost of money. The prime has risen three times in the last few months and could be set to jump another four.

- This will have further implications for the real estate market. Already there have been effects of higher mortgage rates - an end to multiple offers, stabilizing prices and a lessening of demand in most markets. Higher borrowing costs also stem the tide of home equity loans, which are used extensively for home renovation.

So, the prospect of more after-tax disposable income on the part of consumers is enticing. It is money that bubbles from the government to taxpayers at precisely the right time – after a long economic up-cycle is starting to wobble.

In my books there is never anything wrong with politicians giving people back their own cash, just as smaller government is exactly the kind you want going into any kind of slower-growth economy. So, if the result of this election is Ottawa (whatever colour) that reduces the tax burden, trims spending, promotes incentives to invest, stimulates small business and generally changes the oil and spark plugs and whacks out the air filter, then it's a good



Makeshifts: quick but painful

A carpenter who uses duct tape to re-attach a hammer head, or a painter who ties himself to a roof ladder with a piece of rope, or a worker in a warehouse who stands on a stack of boxes instead of a ladder all have one thing in common. They are using makeshift solutions.

Makeshift solutions, by definition, offer us quick fixes to our problems. Makeshift problems occur with tools as well as personal protective equipment. Examples include: opting for hiking boots instead of steel-toed work boots on the job site or using gardening gloves instead required work gloves. Using makeshift

equipment or wearing the incorrect PPE increase your chances of getting injured on-the-job.

Ever hear the saying, "duct tape is a person's best friend"? Here's an example of what can happen when using this quick solution: A carpenter tried to re-attach the head of his hammer to the handle using his "best

friend", his role of duct tape. When the head of the hammer came flying off, he received a broken thumb. His thumb may have healed, but now his buddies call him by his new nickname: Duct Tape.

If we are honest with ourselves, we can all remember a time when we used a makeshift solution. While variations in makeshift solutions are only limited by the creativity of humans, the reasons we use them are few. Two of the most common reasons are saving time and saving money.

Saving time is a concept you have to put into perspective. Whose time are you saving? Are you really saving time? Over time your

use of a makeshift solution increases your risk of injury. The odds are that if you suffer an injury it will cost you working time. It will also likely cost the company production time. So you are really betting days and even months of your working life just to save a few minutes.

Saving money

Sure, having the right tools and safety equipment can be costly. But if this is a makeshift solution, you'll probably need a new tool or the right one tomorrow. So, where are the savings? And when you try to make do with faulty or improper safety equipment, you are really not doing anything other than risking your ability to work and be productive.

While it might look like you are saving time or saving money with a makeshift solution, chances are you are doing anything but saving. The reality is that you are throwing the dice, crossing your fingers, and betting your life the duct tape won't break






Fitting tribute to fallen comrade, continued from page

known as "Fallen Airborne". With the general concept of the picture in mind, Pecota needed to see for herself a typical parachute used by the soldiers of the CPC.

As an artist, much effort was required to satisfy her artistic inquiry into parachute structure. Captain Cavle Oberwarth and Sergeant Sean Willard obligingly repositioned a round, green plume of a silken canopy numerous times before Pecota got what she needed

to complete her image.

Pecota does not expect the tribute to be completed before March due to the fact she will be leaving Canada for Kandahar in the next couple of weeks as an embedded news media representative of the National Post. While in Afghanistan, she will be taking pictures of soldiers for the newspaper and also for a book she is producing on the Canadian soldier. In addition, she will be setting up an art exhibit for the deployed

troops and will leave it behind for their enjoyment. The exhibit will include portraits of hockey greats and, of course, soldiers.

Pecota's esteem for the military and love of art have been with her for much of her life. As a youth, she contacted a recruiting office to inquire whether there was anything available for her relating to the arts. The person she reached replied candidly, "only the art of war, ma'am."

Her talent has not been

wasted, Pecota chose to pursue an art career and has gone on to produce a body of work that includes portraits of personalities such as Don Cherry, Wayne Gretzky, Mike Tyson, Shania Twain and many others. During the 2006 Olympic Winter Games, Pecota will be the only Canadian artist exhibiting photographs and images of Canada in three different exhibitions in Italy.


