Centennial of Flight in Canada: Silver Dart

The Silver Dart, piloted by John under the tutelage of Dr Alexander Alexander Douglas (J.A.D.) McCurdy made the first airplane flight in Canada on the 23 February 1909 over ice covered Baddeck Bay, Nova Scotia.

On its second attempt the silverwinged machine rose to a height of 3-9 m above the ice and travelled a total distance of 800m at approx. 65 km/hr. Over 100 of Bell's closest friends and neighbors witnessed the first flight of a British subject anywhere in the Empire.

The Silver Dart flew more than 200 times before being damaged beyond repair while conducting trials for the military at CFB Petawawa in early August 1909.

Silver Dart: The first powered, heavier than air machine to fly in Canada was built by J.A.D. McCurdy and his friend Frederick W. "Casey" Baldwin of the Aerial Experiment Association (AEA)

Graham Bell.

The "aerodrome" (Bell's preferred term) had a 14.9m wingspan and an all up weight of 390 Kg, pilot included.

The frame and structure was made of steel tube, bamboo, friction tape, wire and wood.

The wings were covered with Silver Japanese Silk, hence the name Silver Dart.

The engine, a 35 HP V8 was supplied by Glen H. Curtiss an American motorcycle designer and manufacturer who had been recruited as a member of the Association.

J.A.D. McCurdy, (2 August 1886 -25 June 1961): Born in Baddeck, NS, he was known as "Douglas".

He attended St Andrews College and graduated from the University of Toronto Mechanical Engineering in 1906.

In 1907 he joined Alexander



Air Force museum showcases first Canadian flight

The National Air Force Museum of Canada (NAFMC), located at 8 Wing/CFB Trenton is showcasing "an historic event," the first powered airplane flight by a British subject in Canada.

On February 23, 1909 engineer J.A.D. McCurdy made Canadian aviation history by piloting the Silver Dart, a "heavier-than-air machine" designed over a two-year period by the Aerial Experiment Association (AEA) under the direction of inventor Alexander Graham Bell. Described as a group of likeminded aviation enthusiasts dedicated to creating a "practical aerodrome," the AEA had supported several successful flights of the Silver Dart in New York State earlier in 1909 before shipping the plane to Baddeck, Nova Scotia, the location of Bell's summer home.

McCurdy flew the Silver Dart, with a wingspan of 14.9 meters and total weight of 390 kilograms (pilot included), across Baddeck Bay at elevations

between three and nine ing military trials in early meters over 0.8 kilometers, reaching an estimated top speed of 65 kilometers per

The Silver Dart flew more than 200 times before being damaged beyond repair upon landing at what is now CFB Petawawa durAugust of 1909.

To honour McCurdy's first Canadian flight, NAFMC is displaying a large photo description of the event, and a scale model of the Silver Dart. A scale reproduction of the 1914 Burgess-Dunne, the first

aircraft purchased for the Canadian military will also be displayed. The Silver Dart exhibition opens Friday, February 20.

As noted by Colonel Mike Hood, Wing Commander, 8 Wing/CFB Trenton in his February 13 column in The Contact,



1979 - Ten students graduated from the first Basic Flight Engineer Course given by 426 (T) Training Squadron. Candidates for this course came from a variety of technical trades, and all held the rank of Corporal or Master Corporal. After successfully completing the 12week program, graduates were posted to air bases across Canada.

8 Wing Personnel at Work: Chief Warrant Officer Curt Campaigne

As Chief of the "Gypsies," Squadron Chief Warrant Officer Curt Campaigne manages more than just Drill, Dress Discipline.

SCWO The (Squadron Chief Warrant Officer) for 8 Air Communication and Control Squadron (8 ACCS), colloquially known as the "Gypsy" squadron, is fundamental in ensuring this unique Canadian Forces unit continues to live up to its motto of "Showing the Way."

CWO Campaigne enrolled in the CF in May, 1977 as an Aerospace Communications and Information Systems Technician (ATIS Tech).

Throughout his career, he has served in several positions, from a sixmonth tour in Alert in 1983, to the Telecommunications Warrant Officer for the MARLANT (Maritime Forces Atlantic) dockyard in Halifax.

as the ATIS Occupation Training Manager at 1 Canadian Air Division in Winnipeg, which involved working to help develop efficient training standards for his trade.

As SCWO of 8 ACCS, CWO Campaigne works with the Commanding Officer (CO) to ensure the squadron meets its mandate of rapidly deploying airfield communications and radar equipment, by ensuring the required resources of personnel and equipment are efficiently and effectively allocated. He is also responsible for co-ordinating any parades, honours and awards required for the squadron, and has previously fulfilled the role of Acting Wing Chief Warrant Officer.

CWO Campaigne is also active as a member of the CF Speakers Bureau, and has spoken to candidates at both occupational and leadership courses about his experiences, and on the CO/CWO relationship in an Air Command.




CHARLIE POTATOES

Remembering...Warrant Officer Gerald William Alexander Bell

Anniversary Anecdotes

They called him "the brown birdman". At the controls of a Tiger Moth aircraft in the skies over Hamilton's Mount Hope Airport, he wasn't himself aware that he was making history.

Gerald William Alexander "Gerry" Bell was born on 17 February 1909, the son of Ernest and Florence Bell. A lifelong career in aviation did not, at first, seem to be in Gerry Bell's future.

Since 1928, much to his parents' delight, he had been studying medicine at the University of Western Ontario. But then Gerry experienced one of those serendipitous moments in life.

"This old biplane came whooshing over the family home, and landed in a nearby field." Before long he was asking about the price of flying lessons. Medicine was not immediately left behind, however, as Gerry feared disappointing his proud parents. Instead he took to the skies secretly.

But it was not a secret he would be able to keep long to himself.

"I was at home one afternoon and the doorbell rang. I looked out a window and saw these two big guys standing there. They had rumpled grey suits and hats, and they looked pretty stern. I'm thinking to myself 'they're cops,' but I couldn't think of what I'd done. Anyway, my mother opened the door and one guy says: 'Does Gerry Bell live here?' I'm sure my mother was close to a heart attack, but she managed to tell them I did.

'We're from the newspaper and we want to interview him about getting his pilot's licence,' the other guy told her. My mother started to tell them they must have the wrong Gerry Bell when I came to the door. I told them I was the guy they wanted and, yes, I did have my licence. My mother didn't know what to say. That was how my parents learned I'd been flying."²

The secret of "Canada's only Negro aviator," as printed in the *Hamilton Spectator* at the time, was a secret no more.

Gerry Bell had earned his private and commercial pilot rating in 1931. Soon he had also earned an Air Engineers Certificate. Then, he turned his sights to the fledgling Royal Canadian Air Force.

In the 1920s and 1930s, there were few opportunities for anyone seeking a career in military aviation.

The RCAF was small, training facilities few and jobs scarce. The policy of enlisting only those of "pure European descent" made it all the more difficult for a black man to be accepted into the Air Force, but

in 1931 Gerry Bell achieved just that. Having met the requirements and been accepted as an airman, he waited for an opening in the small force.

However, a vacancy did not open up before cutbacks, a result of the Great Depression, decimated the RCAF and left Gerry Bell waiting for a chance to

But he was not one to languish in waiting. He was a successful semi-pro boxer and a member of the Hamilton Olympic Club Track Team as a sprinter.

In 1933 and 1934, he competed against another famous black sprinter, the American runner Jessie Owens.

He even participated as a trainer in the 1936 Summer Olympic Games held in Berlin, Germany.³

It was an eventful year as Gerry also finally enlisted in the RCAF in 1936, joining Hamilton's No.119 (Bomber) Squadron, Auxiliary.

Thus began of a 28-year career with the Air Force and a 45-year career with aviation. During its course, Gerry Bell would test new bomber aircraft, train bomber pilots for the famed No.6 (RCAF) Command and join 424 Squadron flying operations against the enemy.

Following the war, he remained with the RCAF and served at bases across Canada and with No.3 Wing in Germany before a final posting to RCAF Station Trenton and

retirement in 1961. Along the way he earned a Pilot Wing, an Air Gunner Wing and a Flight Engineer Wing.

Gerry William Alexander Bell died on 17 January 1989. He was buried at St George's Cemetery, Trenton.

His medals and memorabilia are displayed at the National Air Force Museum of Canada - a tribute to a modest man who broke the colour barrier in Canadian skies.

85th Anniversary of the Royal Canadian Air Force

<u>DID YOU KNOW?</u> The Aerial Experiment Association (AEA) included five members: Alexander Graham Bell, Frederick W. ("Casey") Baldwin, J.A.D. McCurdy, Glen H. Curtiss and Lt Thomas Selfridge, US Army.

The AEA built and flew three airplanes before the Silver Dart: the Red Wing, the White Wing and the June Bug (later renamed the Loon when pontoons were added in an unsuccessful attempt to create a seaplane). All the flights took place in the United States.

Alexander Graham Bell had experimented extensively with kites before moving to the question of heavier-than-air, powered flight.





"Move those fire trucks," he said, and the drivers rolled the rigs forward.

The two fire trucks, and two school buses had cordoned off a 29' x 13' fibreglass inground pool shell, donated by Oasis Pools. As Isaiah perched on the edge of his new pool, surrounded by an assortment of pool toys (some of which were donated by the SAR techs), he learned that the \$30,000 unit would be installed at his home this spring, complete with decking, fencing and landscaping donated by area companies and contractors such as Klemencic Homes, Sprout's Premier Earth Products, Green Thumb Landscaping, Carmen Nurseries, Rob Hall and Matt Down.

The looks of surprise and gratitude on the faces of Isaiah and his family were proof that Make-A-Wish Canada indeed helps realize people's dreams. And it's not the first time 8 Wing/CFB Trenton has been involved in the process.

Two years ago, nine-year-old "Philip" had his wish to own a Nintendo Wii system, and to shake hands with Spiderman granted, with a lot of organizational help from O'Quinn and Davis, and "phenomenal support" from 8 Wing/CFB Trenton.

The young man with a terminal heart condition was driven by limousine to Baker Island where Spiderman was waiting to greet him. Then a SAR crew arrived, hoisting down a member with a complete Wii system and other items. Finally, a CC130 Hercules made a low pass over the island to honour Philip.

"It was quite moving," O'Quinn said.

How appreciative is O'Quinn of last week's SAR-Tech involvement?

















Think about the possibilities: There's a safety message in Murphy's Law

Safety

Murphy's Law states "If anything can go wrong, sometimes it will." That's a negative message. Safety is a positive thing. But when you think about it, Murphy's Law does have something to tell us about safety.

Safety planning means thinking of the worst that could happen, and taking steps to prevent it. Start with a negative idea, and end up taking steps for a positive outcome. As an example, if you temporarily place a box of

supplies in a rarely-used aisle, Murphy's Law says that somebody will walk along, fall over the box and break an arm. According to Murphy's Law, that "someone" could be

How can we put Murphy's Law to good use? We do this by imagining the consequences, then take measures to introduce safety into the situation as prevention. In other words, use your personal protective equipment and recommended safe work practices to protect yourself.

When you get in your vehicle and buckle up, you don't do it because you think everything is going to go right, you do it because there is a chance that some drunk will run a red light, or that you'll hit a patch of ice and miss a curve on the road.

You wear your hard hat on the job not because you expect everything to go in your favour, but because there's a chance someone might drop a brick from above, or you might accidentally bump your head.

You use the handrail on stairs, not because you're confident that everyone else has looked after the job-site, but to protect yourself.

When you follow strict safety rules regarding confined space entry, it's not because you are optimistic that the atmosphere in there is fresh air, it's because of the chance that it may become short of oxygen or contaminated by noxious gases.

When you make sure machine guards are in place, you're protecting yourself perhaps just the one time when you can't pull your hand sometime it will." Those are away fast enough.

When you learn CPR, first aid or rescue techniques, it

because it makes good sense doesn't have much to do with the days when everything goes right. It has a lot to do with the rare occasions when a co-worker collapses with a heart attack or is seriously injured.

> That's how Murphy's Law relates to safety. It means thinking of the worst thing that can happen, and taking positive steps to prevent that occurrence or to be prepared to deal with it.



Think about the possibilities: There's a safety message in Murphy's Law

Safety

Submitted by Don Heans Wing General Safety Officer

Murphy's Law states "If anything can go wrong, sometimes it will." That's a negative message. Safety is a positive thing. But when you think about it, Murphy's Law does have something to tell us about safety.

Safety planning means thinking of the worst that could happen, and taking steps to prevent it. Start with a negative idea, and end up taking steps for a positive outcome. As an example, if you temporarily place a box of

supplies in a rarely-used aisle, Murphy's Law says that somebody will walk along, fall over the box and break an arm. According to Murphy's Law, that "someone" could be

How can we put Murphy's Law to good use? We do this by imagining the consequences, then take measures to introduce safety into the situation as prevention. In other words, use your personal protective equipment and recommended safe work practices to protect yourself.

When you get in your vehicle and buckle up, you don't do it because you think everything is going to go right, you do it because there is a chance that some drunk will run a red light, or that you'll hit a patch of ice and miss a curve on the road.

You wear your hard hat on the job not because you expect everything to go in your favour, but because there's a chance someone might drop a brick from above, or you might accidentally bump your head.

You use the handrail on stairs, not because you're confident that everyone else has looked after the job-site, but

because it makes good sense doesn't have much to do with to protect yourself.

When you follow strict safety rules regarding confined space entry, it's not because you are optimistic that the atmosphere in there is fresh air, it's because of the chance that it may become short of oxygen or contaminated by noxious gases.

When you make sure machine guards are in place, you're protecting yourself perhaps just the one time when you can't pull your hand sometime it will." Those are away fast enough.

When you learn CPR, first aid or rescue techniques, it

the days when everything goes right. It has a lot to do with the rare occasions when a co-worker collapses with a heart attack or is seriously injured.

That's how Murphy's Law relates to safety. It means thinking of the worst thing that can happen, and taking positive steps to prevent that occurrence or to be prepared to deal with it.

"If anything can go wrong, important words to remember in planning and practicing safe work procedures.




