## Air Force really delivers in earthquake-ravaged Haiti

I have just experienced our Air Force operations in aid of the people of Haiti, and viewed the final air component preparations for the Olympics in support of the RČMP.

Such a short time ago we were telling our people, 'Enjoy the holidays with your families, and when we come back, we will be focused on getting ready for Olympics. Afghanistan and training, things should be busy for us in the coming months.' Then tragedy takes place in Haiti and we must act. In a matter of hours, our people, and our families commit to help save lives and heal the wounds caused by this devastation. And 'busy' was redefined.

I share with you just one

example of your commitment, from Op Hestia. Due to the amount of international aid coming into Portau-Prince, the airport was so congested that Canada had just four time slots per day to land and deliver supplies. We needed an additional entry point into Haiti. Our airfield engineers assessed the Jacmel airfield, and with confidence in the capabilities of the Hercules, and the experience of our personnel, we took the risk of the first Hercules flight into this tiny airstrip in the hills. Less than 24 hours later, your Air Force had opened a strategic 'backdoor' to deliver more aid to the Haitian people, and equipping the DART and the field hospital.

Wherever you work, whether in the Division,

within the Air Force or within the Forces, you are helping carry the workload of a nation both at peace and at war. Your Wing, and every Wing, is executing an impressive scope of missions each and every day. You are stretched, but you are doing as much as you can and delivering results, showing your professionalism and your dedication.

Your work is impressive, and I thank you, and your families, for what you are doing for Canadians, for Haitians, for Afghans, for sailors on the high seas, and for so many other people in

#### humanitarian aid Providing continuous, outstanding

Some refer to the catastrophic earthquake that struck Haiti as a tragedy of unspeakable proportions, and while that may be true, the people of Haiti continue to possess levels of hope far greater than most would

This optimism stems from an outpouring of relief support coming into Haiti; and not only are members of the Canadian Forces at the forefront of Canada's current efforts, but 8 Wing/CFB Trenton is at the heart of it all.

The Canadian Expeditionary Force (CEFCOM) Command reports cargo delivered to Haiti, thus far, totals more than 2,439,555 pounds, and of that, 865,711 pounds of relief goods.

8 Wing/CFB Trenton is the gateway for those very efforts, and during the past three weeks, the Wing has experienced one of the busiest flying periods ever.

"During this relatively short period there were a total of 73 missions flown in support of the operation: 36 Globemaster flights, 19 Hercules trips, and two Airbus and two Challenger missions, all dedicated to Op HESTIA, not to mention the 14 chartered flights also used to augment the CF's own airlift capability," said Lieutenant-Colonel David Murphy, 8 Wing Operations Officer.

LCol Murphy said that everyone has pushed to ensure the required equipment and supplies are delivered as soon as possible to those needing the aid.

Colonel Russ Williams. Commander, 8 Wing/CFB Trenton, is also extremely proud of 8 Wing's response in support of the people of

"Personnel from all squadrons and units have rallied in support of this mission," he said. "Often well 'above and beyond,' outstanding achieving results in very short order."

Col Williams explained that the nature of this 24/7 operation, coupled with the requirement to deploy a significant number of personnel into theatre, has resulted in a very positive situation, whereby personnel not normally directly involved in the conduct of operations have been drawn into these positions, with incredible results. The net result has been that 8 Wing/CFB Trenton has been, and is being, recognized far and wide for this very significant contribu-

"Many sections of the Wing have been strained almost to the limit," he explains, "yet, we continue to meet, and exceed, expectations.

Col Williams said the base-wise response has been spectacular.

"I must recognize, in particular, the herculean efforts of 2 Air Movements Squadron, the key to flight line success in a mission such as this; Wing Operations, for their lead role in the planning and execution of the operation; 429 (T) Squadron for their three-aircraft, all-hands-on-deck surge; and the WLEO branch for its efforts in support of Op HESTIA, itself, but also the very direct support provided to 8 Wing personnel operating in theatre," said Colonel Williams.

internationale affluant à Port-au-Prince, l'aéroport était tellement congestionné que le Canada n'avait que quatre créneaux de temps par jour pour poser ses aéronefs et livrer ses approvisionnements. Nous avions besoin d'un autre point d'entrée en Haïti. Après que notre équipe de génie de l'air eut évalué l'aérodrome de Jacmel, et connaissant les capacités des Hercules et de notre personnel expérimenté, nous avons tenté un premier vol à destination de cette minuscule bande d'atterrissage dans les

collines. Moins de 24 heures plus tard, la Force aérienne du Canada avait ouvert une «porte arrière» stratégique pour fournir davantage d'aide au peuple haïtien et pour approvisionner l'Équipe d'intervention en cas de catastrophe (EICC) et l'hôpital de campagne.



## This Week in

1980 – Three Buffalo transport aircraft and 26 personnel from 424 Squadron departed CFB Trenton this week, bound for Salisbury, Rhodesia (now South Africa). The deployment formed the vanguard of Canada's contribution to the Commonwealth Observer Force being assembled to monitor national elections scheduled for February 14-29, 1980 in Zimbabwe. The exercise was commanded by Lieutenant-Colonel Ken Kee.

1990 - Under the direction of Major Gary McDermott, CFB Trenton Base Transportation Officer and coordinator of the Trenton Memorial Hospital Building Fund, containers were distributed throughout the base to encourage members to donate loose change to the community project. The 8 Wing initiative launched what became a five-year campaign to raise funds for TMH.

2000 - Lieutenant-Colonel Chris Colton (now Executive Director of the National Air Force Museum of Canada in Trenton) was honoured with a Chief of Defence Staff (CDS) Commendation for his outstanding performance during Operation Central in 1998. LCol Colton, 8 Wing/CFB Trenton's Wing Operations Officer, was Acting Wing Commander during a particularly critical deployment time for the Disaster Assistance Response Team.

## Air Force works around the clock providing humanitarian aid

There is no question about it – Canada's Air Force is engaged in busy times.

Involved in a number of operations around the world, assisting millions on a yearly basis, a main area of focus with recent support efforts have placed Air Force personnel in the centre of providing humanitarian aid relief to grief-stricken Haiti.

"Providing the aid needed in Haiti has been a momentous effort by 8 Wing," said Lieutenant-Colonel David Murphy, 8 Wing Operations Manager. "One which we consider a tremendous success."

Encompassed in that are many men and women working 24 hours a day to ensure the success of Canadian Forces missions. The level of operations can create chaotic times, however, it is because of the training and skills of Air Force personnel, that helps to bring order and structure to both the skies and on the ground.

During his fifth flight to Haiti since Op HES-TIA launched, 429 (Transport) Squadron CC177 Globemaster pilot Lieutenant-Colonel John Tringali said the situation on the ground at Aéroport International Toussaint (Port-au-Prince's international airport) is improving.

ing.

"The first couple of days were really chaotic but it's gradually getting better," said LCol Tringali. "It was difficult to begin with because there aren't any taxi-ways, there's just one main runway."

Thankfully, the conditions at the airport that they were presented to work with are manageable, although shorter (runway) than most, leaving very little for pilots to work with. It was the amount of traffic that was creating more of a concern.

Flying for more than 12 years, LCol Tringali has been involved in many missions, supporting a variety of operations, and has learned that the level of response is what really matters, and eventually you will figure out the means of supporting that.

"In this kind of humanitarian mission, in response to a natural disaster, everybody wants to get there first, which causes lots of commotion on the ground," he said. "It's getting easier now as the traffic has slowed down."

Because the air traffic has eased quite a bit since January 14, when CF personnel first responded as part of Op HESTIA, it has made the lives of those responding to the relief efforts easier to deliver aid to Haitians and provide supply to our troops, said LCol Tringali.

"We are prepared for these situations," said LCol Tringali. "It's not a question of whether an earthquake or a tornado destroyed a country or a city; it doesn't make much of a difference. It's more about the way we respond to such disasters. In every case, our work remains the same."

In every natural disaster you are faced with the same obstacles, explains LCol Tringali.

"There's too much air traffic, not enough support on the ground (because things have been demolished) – and every airplane on the planet wants to land immediately," he said.

Helping people was why LCol Tringali decided to peruse his flying career in airlift, as supposed to fighters.

"With fighters you do all of the training but don't ever really get to do your job," he said. "In airlift you are always helping to do something – there's re-supply, evacuations, transporting troops, etc. The downside to that is that your schedules are unpredictable but you learn to adapt, and at the end of the day, all that matters is that you've helped to make a difference."

Preparing a load of supplies that left 8 Wing/CFB Trenton in the early morning hours of February 1, were a number of personnel, including those loading the CC177 Globemaster from 2 Air Movements Squadron (2 Air Mov Sqn).

Master Corporal Chris McLean, a traffic technician from 2 Air Mov Sqn, was part of the ground crew involved with this particular load out of 8 Wing. He has seen hundreds of thousands of pounds of supplies pass through this hub of Canada's Air Force as part of Op HESTIA.

"It has been a constant stream of water and rations every flight, plus large vehicles and transportation equipment and movers are being delivered regularly."

Deciding what is onboard each flight is the responsibility of a team from 8 Wing, working in conjunction with the Federal Department of External Affairs and the Canadian International Development Agency.

"An ops group determines what is required for each flight. There's a cargo ops that builds up the loads and the load plans for the aircraft, and then we (traffic techs) carry out the load plans," said MCpl McLean

On the ground in Haiti minutes after the plane lands, new traffic technicians begin unloading the aircraft and transporting supplies to Canada's designated camp located on the airfield.

Although the number of relief flights into Haiti has dropped since earlier days, the activity level for the traffic technicians has not slowed down.

Colonel Scott Clancy, Air Component Commander of Joint Task Force Haiti (JTFH), has personnel working every minute of every day, if the requirement is there.

"They are doing a fantastic job, and they are working around the clock," said Col Clancy. "Whenever there is not an aircraft on the ground, they go to ground, get rest they need because when those birds are coming in, they are up loading and unloading."

These traffic technicians also work to unload contracted aircraft delivering loads.

"They may unload six aircraft between 0500 hrs and 1200 hrs," he said. "They get the rest when they can because they know they will have other loads coming in."

And with the CC177 load capacities of up to three times that of a CC130 Hercules, the full loads bring plenty of the resources desperately needed.

"We have some of the greatest people working under our command," said Col Clancy. "It makes you very proud to be a part of such a large Canadian family."

Regardless of who you speak with who has been a part of these efforts in Haiti – from technicians to pilots, to commanders – the outlook remains the same. To get what is needed, to where it is needed, as soon as possible, and that is exactly what is happening.

## Personnel at Work: Jim Pullen - Six decades of service, still going strong

The year was 1951. The Canadian Government had just committed Canadian troops to a three-year mission in Korea; the reserve elements of all three Canadian military services joined their Regular Force counterparts in recruiting women; and Jim Pullen joined the Royal Canadian Air Force.

"I actually wanted to be an electrical technician working on aircraft," Pullen told The Contact recently. "They gave me Supply, and I've been there ever since."

Nearly 60 years later, Pullen still mans a desk, this time at 8 Wing/CFB Trenton, and without the uniform. He is a critical part of the 8 Wing Supply's operations, and a person whose "wealth of knowledge" is invaluable to both his colleagues and his supervisors.

"Jim has almost 60 years of service. When he leaves, that is a vast amount of knowledge that will walk out the door," said Major Michel Lefebvre, Officer in Charge, 8 Wing Supply.

Just starting his 60<sup>th</sup> year of public service (combined military and civilian), Pullen began his journey to becoming "Mr. Supply" at the former Manning Depot in Ontario. Aylmer, Sometime during that initial training, a sergeant learned Pullen had worked in the shipping department of a shoe factory before enlisting.

"He said, 'You'd make a good supply tech," Pullen said. "I'm still supplying people."

His first stint at 8 Wing ("on what they now would call OJT") came shortly after enlistment, when Pullen spent two weeks here before returning to Aylmer for his formal Supply Course. They liked him so much in Aylmer, he was posted to that Depot for the next six years before shipping out to CFB Winnipeg, a posting he held until 1964.

"Things were so new there, they were still building the new PMQs," Pullen said. "It was so cold; and so muddy you couldn't drive your car into the housing area."

In 1964, Pullen was deployed to Turkey with two other military members, and two civilians, ostensibly to support aircraft supplied by Canada to that country. The timing wasn't perfect for a man whose job it was to get parts.

"My sergeant and I had no sooner landed in Turkey than the Canadian government froze the supply of all parts for those aircraft because of hostilities between Greece and Turkey," Pullen said. "It was the start of the Cyprus situation."

Pullen was posted to the former CFB Downsview from 1965 to 1970...always in Supply ... where he worked parttime as a clerk in the drapery department of Eaton's Yorkdale.

He recalled that most military men of the day had some part-time work outside the Forces to provide those little extras for the family.

Pullen went on to postings in Goose Bay, Edmonton and Ottawa, with two separate stints in Germany.

"I really enjoyed that second posting to Germany, because my wife and I went by ourselves, without the kids, and we got to do a lot of travelling," he said.

It was after being posted to Ottawa in 1985 that the Pullen's decided to put down roots in the Trenton area, buying a home in Brighton. Pullen retired from military service in 1987 ("but not for very long") with the rank of Master Warrant Officer.

Returning to supply work at 8 Wing that same

year as a civilian, Pullen started in 10 Hangar, then 7 Hangar and other locations before moving in 1996 to his current station in Wing Supply at 46 Portage Drive. His commitment to duty is legendary.

"I've seen a lot of big changes in my time," he said. "I always say I've gone from a straight pen in an ink well to the wonderful world of computers!"

"I remember a time when we had to get a signature for purchase orders over \$49.99," Pullen said. He has signing authority today for items up to \$5,000.

Because of personal commitments during the week, Pullen has arranged with Major Lefebvre (and his predecessors) to start work at 5:30 a.m. each day, leaving early in the afternoon three days a week; but he works until 4 p.m. on the remaining days to make up the time. It's an arrangement that works well for everyone.

"Nobody's had a problem with it in the past 10 years, and as long as I'm working, and have the other commitments, I'll continue to follow (that schedule)," he said.

So, after 59 years of service and counting, will Jim Pullen ever retire?

"My kids won't let me retire. They're worried, because they see so many people who retire and then they die shortly afterwards," Pullen said. "So, I tell everybody that I'm going to play it one day at a time."







It was 'Happy 42nd Birthday to us' on February 1, when more than 90 members of 8 Wing/CFB Trenton's Logistics (LOG) Branch gathered in the Cadet Dining Hall for cake and congratulations.

## Let There Be Light: 8 ACCS lights up Jacmel Airfield for night landings

No fuel. No lights. No motor cars.

On arrival to the Jacmel Airfield, Haiti, on January 19, 2010, the crew of the first Canadian Forces CC-130 Hercules aircraft to land in the south of earthquakeravaged Haiti, found little more than an asphalt runway equipped only to handle daytime flights.

It wasn't the first Canadian Air Force aircraft to arrive there. Since 14 January 2010, Jacmel Airfield had been used as a base for CH-146 *Griffon* helicopter reconnaissance operations.

On January 19, 2010, Major Scott Frost of 435 Squadron, Winnipeg, Manitoba, safely landed the first Canadian Air Force CC-130 *Hercules* on the short and austere 3,300-foot Jacmel runway. It was a very steep approach, in order to avoid trees blocking the end of the runway. The trees obstructing the approach were subsequently removed by Canadian Air Force and Navy personnel. Although this reduced the approach angle to six degrees, it remains twice as steep as the standard three-degree CC-130 approach.

Members of 8 Air Control and Communication Squadron (8ACCS), from 8 Wing Trenton, Ontario, immediately installed a tactical runway lighting system at Jacmel Airfield, permitting around-the-clock relief operations.

By opening Jacmel Airfield 24-hoursa-day, Canada contributed to multinational efforts aimed at relieving the intense congestion at Toussaint-Louverture International Airport in Port-au-Prince

While in Haiti, 8 ACCS technicians also set up 3.8 metre satellite dishes in Port-au-Prince and in Jacmel, providing dedicated telephone and high-speed data lifelines back to Canada. "It's a telecoms exchange in a box," explained MWO James Marshall of 8 ACCS. "We provide full Defence Wide Area Network and internet access as well as the ability to place phone calls from Haiti."

While the work of 8 ACCS in Haiti was impressive and certainly appreciated by all involved in this operation, it is even more impressive to think that all this was accomplished by a very small team. Indeed, MWO Marshall said that 8 ACCS now has 34 personnel deployed on operations. "Between the Olympic

Games, Alert and now Haiti, I have only ten members remaining here in 8 Wing – half of them Air Force Reservists," he added

"The reservists who belong to 8 ACCS are altogether putting 80 years of experience at the disposal of this operation," observed WO Keith Risser, who usually works part-time for the Air Force Reserve, but has stepped in to work full-time during Op HESTIA contributing to this great 8 ACCS success.

Overall, 8 ACCS' work in Haiti is nothing short of amazing. By helping the Canadian Air Force operate safely day and night, it is doubling the rate at which lifesaving supplies can flow into Jacmel and reach Haitians in desperate need. Who would have thought that a few lights could make such a big difference?

## DART medics help bring Haitian baby into the world

JACMEL, HAITI – A team of Canadian Forces medics helped deliver a baby girl at the Disaster Assistance Response Team's (DART) medical clinic in Jacmel Thursday afternoon, January 28.

It was the first baby delivered at the clinic and the first delivery for many of the medics – an experience they say was an immense morale booster.

Jean-Jilles Marie's water broke the night before. Her husband, Jean-Charles Pierre, had taken them to Hôpital St. Michel, but they didn't receive any help from the medical staff there. At 7:30 the next morning, one of the clinic's interpreters took them to the DART clinic and she was ushered into one of a number of modular tents.

Corporal Cheryl Belanger, a medic from Canadian Forces Health Services Ottawa, started readying the necessary equipment and supplies in preparation for the delivery. In the meantime, Torontobased Cpl Petra Sutton initiated an intravenous drip on Ms Marie and tried to

ease her discomfort.

As the morning drew on, Ms. Marie continued to dilate as the medical staff monitored her situation. Just after noon, with her contractions becoming more frequent, Ms. Marie began to deliver her child on a fold-out medical table under a modular tent at the city's port as yellow-smocked medics gathered about her in the stifling heat of the midday sun.

With doctors Major baby's

Annie Bouchard and Captain Rob Ennis providing guidance, Cpl Belanger and Cpl Sutton were joined corporals Karine Rousselle, Melissa Bisutti, Monique Bartlett and Master Corporal Lucie Rouleau to help Ms. Marie deliver her child. Together, they encouraged, comforted and supported the mother through 25 minutes of labour.

"I was holding the baby's head with

Monique," explained Cpl Rousselle. "As soon as the head came out, the liquid came out. We got a shoulder out and the rest slipped out right after."

With the cheering medics holding on to the child, Monique-Lucie Marie was born into the world at 12:45 p.m. Cpl Bisutti clamped and cut the umbilical cord and the squalling six-pound baby girl with a full head of hair was placed in an impro-

vised bassinette made out of a cardboard box lined with sterile sheets and towels.

Maj Bouchard, a general practitioner with a specialty in obstetrics and a veteran of a thousand deliveries, praised the work of her medics.

"I could have been in a civilian hospital in Canada and it would have been the same level of performance. They were awesome," she said.

For all the medics who participated, the birth – a first for almost all of them as medics – was a touching experience. Though all are employed in clinics from Gagetown to Toronto, they said that participating in delivering a child is a rare experience.

The birth was also a welcome change from some of the work the DART medical staff have had to do since they arrived in Haiti two weeks ago. Rather than having to perform amputations and other aspects of trauma medicine, the medics said that this experience boosted their morale.

"This experience amazed me. We're here working out of tents with the bare minimum and we were able to work a miracle," remarked Cpl. Belanger.

After a couple hours of rest and medical attention, Ms. Marie walked out of the clinic with her family and its newest addition in tow. She will be back for check-ups both for herself and her newborn daughter, which means the medics at the clinic will have another chance to see the child who touched their lives.

# First baby delivered at DART clinic named after medics

*JACMEL*, *HAITI* – While the birth of the DART medical clinic's first child in Jacmel touched the lives of all the medical staff who helped deliver her on Thursday, January 28, two medics have a permanent link to little girl.

Monique-Lucie Marie's name came courtesy of two of the medics who delivered her: Corporal Monique Bartlett and Master Corporal Lucie Rouleau.

The name, a gesture of gratitude from the girl's father Jean-Charles Pierre, is something both medics say is an event they will never forget.

Cpl Bartlett and MCpl Rouleau, both mothers of girls themselves, were part of the team of medics and doctors who helped deliver the little girl at the DART's medical clinic at the port in Jacmel. Monique literally had a hand in delivering the child – she held the infant's head as it was coming out.

After the baby was born, Cpl her name.

Bartlett asked the father if they had chosen a name for the girl. He asked her what her name was. When she told him 'Monique', he gestured to MCpl Rouleau and asked her name. When Cpl Bartlett answered 'Lucie', he responded, "Her name is Monique-Lucie"

"We were just a part of the team that helped with the delivery of his child," explains Cpl Bartlett. "I just happened to ask him if they had a name for her."

The two Ottawa-based medics are honoured and touched by the expression. They say it is a wonderful experience that reminds them why they became medics in the first place.

"This is the most wonderful experience ever. It makes us realize exactly what we are here to do," says MCpl Rouleau.







## Op HESTIA: Providing continuous, outstanding humanitarian aid, Cont'd from Page 1

Colonel Jean-Marc Lanthier, Deputy Commander Joint Task Force Haiti (JTFH), highlighted some of the relief efforts supporting Op HESTIA on the ground in Haiti, during one of 8 Wing/CFB Trenton's supply flights, which delivered 130,000 lbs of cargo on the morning of February 1, 2010.

Utilizing the assets, skills, resources, tools and strength that define the CF, is exactly what made it possible to bring this high level of support to earthquake victims. Col Lanthier explained they rely on that same training to make their work in Haiti possible.

"This is a continuum of things we do, and is a perfect example of why we do it," said Col Lanthier. "We have our success stories – with the Manitoba flood, the ice storm in Quebec and the floods in

in Quebec and the floods in Saguenay-Lac St. Jean – this is all part of what we do at home, and now we're bringing this help

Op HESTIA currently consists of support from many aspects including: the Disaster Assistance Response Team (DART); one light infantry battalion; a Naval Task Force; six CH146 Griffon helicop-

ters; a CC177 Globemaster;

CC130 Hercules airlift support; and medical facilities.

abroad."

The current joint task force is comprised of approximately 2,000 people, with about 1,700 currently on the ground, and 300 additional people expected to arrive within the next week or so.

JTFH consists of Air Force, Army and Navy personnel, conducting three lines of operation, with a primary mandate to assist in saving lives and mitigating the suffering.

What is different about the relief mission in Haiti is the joint task force - with very strong support of the Air Force, which Colonel Lanthier said is doing an incredible job both on their own, and supporting the task force.

"The Air Force has been constantly moving people, kits, material, equipment and providing tremendous assistance to this mission," he said. "They have also been assisting those in other relief efforts, such as the World Food Programme (WFP), which is part of the United Nations (UN) system."

Operations on the ground in Haiti have been broken down into key areas, Col Lanthier explains.

"The first line of operation is the evacuation of Canadian-entitled persons, at their request," said Col Lanthier. "Also, without water and medical care, you lose lives right away, so we are providing assistance with sanitation, water, medical attention and shelters."

So far the CF has transported more than 3,000 people back to Canada, and have provided them with initial accommodation, and critical (and in some cases, noncritical but required) medical care. They have also been assisting with moving some of Haiti's orphans back to Canada – accelerating the process of adoptions that were already underway.

Identifying the level of destruction that is 'incredibly significant' has helped to generate a priority list of focus. It has also enabled personnel to establish a number of Internally Displaced Person Camps that are currently operating throughout the region.

Of concern amongst all the tragedy have been Port-au-Prince (population of about three million), Jacmel (population 40,000) and Léogâne (population of 170,000). Although Port-au-Prince was the main focus of the international community, it was west of that in Léogâne that was hardest hit, with even greater damage. The incredible need of Léogâne's people became a primary responsibility.

"Initial estimates showed between 80 to 90 per cent of destruction in Léogâne – so you can imagine that level of destruction and that many displaced people living in those temporary camps," said Col Lanthier. "Those camps are our current focus in order to provide them with better living conditions, and avoid the spread of diseases amongst those populations."

It is important to remember that without this support, he explained, those communities would be populated by people living with the lack of basic needs and necessities - in a very cramped environment with a very low level of sanitation.

They have also placed a focus on the efforts in Jacmel, where the same needs assessment/evaluations have taken place, and relief support continues to make an impact.

"We have our people in all the right areas, and although it may have been extremely difficult to put into place, we have found our ways to surpass those obstacles," said Col Lanthier.

He refers to the situation they faced getting into Jacmel, where the only road leading from Port-au-Prince was completely cut off by a landslide.

"It was impossible to pass through with a number of overpasses also destroyed. But because of the DART, they were able to transport people and supplies almost immediately, even under such conditions," said Col Lanthier.

Another general line of operation is to ensure that all of the Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) have the conditions set for them, in order to be able to provide the relief in the longer term. Although, he said, the mandate assisting NGOs is time-limited up until a point.

"The DART normally has a mandate of 40 days – in order to alleviate suffering and provide urgent medical engineering and security that is needed. All of which is for the purpose of creating space for the NGOs to turn around and re-organize themselves," said Col Lanthier.

He also said it has been important to understand that a lot of NGOs have had their personnel either pass away as a result of the earthquake, or are simply left without any resources, especially with warehouses and vehicles destroyed.

For JTFH, creating proper conditions means providing basic critical care to people until the NGOs





are clear, and under the control and security provided by the nation of Haiti.

It becomes even more of a delicate situation when this is all on top of the baseline that already existed in a country receiving relief support before the earthquake.

As an example, the World Food Programme (WFP), a UN system, distributed 1.8 million meals a day to the country prior to the earth-quake. That need has almost doubled now, and Op HESTIA is also helping to provide that extra capacity.

"Once the seaport is open and critical strategic lines of communication are re-opened, these organizations, and WFP will be able to re-establish the normal standard (of operations)," said Col Lanthier. "Right now we are buying them some time, so that they (WFP) are able to meet the emerging needs of the population."

There is no doubt that January 12 changed the lives of the people of Haiti, but guided by our own strength and support, progress is being made.

"Canada has been capable of extremely large efforts and it's because we all come together in support of this one cause," said Col Lanthier. "It's an honour to be part of this humanitarian mission, and to see how much it is appreciated."

Canada responded with people and supplies on the ground within 48 hours after the earthquake. The success stories that have surfaced from then until now lend a very good indication that the people of Haiti will live on to see better days. That things will get better...that things will be "OK."

Ālready, improvement can be seen and although so much has been accomplished, reality is it only

covers a small, but significant margin, of what Haiti will need to completely recover. No timeline is easily placed on such recovery, but in just less than three weeks, things have started to turn around.

"The patients alone we've treated – the lives we've saved, the people we've helped...it is amazing," said Col Lanthier. "Specifically because of the environment in which we have been able to (do so), without the sterile environment of a hospital – performing life-saving surgeries, it's really incredible."

From the initial overwhelming response that created difficulties for

relief to even enter the country let alone be distributed - to international communities working in unity to take action, forces from around the world in all forms have helped to shed light on this devastation.

To date, Canada's operation has distributed 64,000 litres of water, 171,365 meals, providing 4,427 patients with treatment at DART clinics and Field Hospital, and 235 patients have been seen at Village Medical Outreach clinics. And perhaps most importantly, helped to bring a new sense of hope to millions.



## **Activity: Rolly Polly Cookies**



This is a very simple cookie recipe and preschoolers will have fun rolling the dough into balls.

Once baked, these cookies just melt in your mouth!

You will need: One cup soft margarine; ½ cup icing sugar; ½ cup cornstarch; 1 1/3 cup all purpose flour; shredded coconut (optional); and food colouring (optional).

Instructions: Beat together the margarine and icing sugar until they are very fluffy.

Mix in the cornstarch and flour until well blended. If you want to make rainbow cookies, mix in a few drops of food colouring.

The dough will need to go in the refrigerator for an hour so it is not too sticky to handle. When ready, preheat the oven to 325° F.

Break off pieces of dough and roll them between your hands into one-inch balls. If you like, you can roll the balls in coconut before baking.

Place the cookies on ungreased baking sheets and bake for about 15 minutes.

Allow them to cool on racks. This recipe makes about 40 cookies.

Enjoy this more with Comfort, Play and Teach<sup>TM</sup>:

Comfort: This dough has a very silky texture and is nice to touch. Children will enjoy the repetitive action of rolling pieces of dough between their hands as they shape each cookie.

Play: This activity lets children learn using their senses. They touch the dough, they smell the baking cookies and soon they get to taste them. Play an I Spy game to make sure they are looking too! "I spy with my little eye, something that is sweet, white, made of metal, flat...."

Teach: While making these cookies, children will definitely learn about circles! But they also learn about numbers. How many cookies are on each tray? They can learn about colours. What happens if we put two drops of red food colouring and two drops of yellow?

## Mealtime.org Caribbean Stir-Fried Shrimp

#### Ingredients:

2 teaspoons vegetable oil, divided

1 medium onion, coarsely chopped

1 can (20 ounces) pineapple chunks in juice, drained, and patted dry

1 pound frozen, large shrimp, thawed, peeled and cleaned

1 clove garlic, minced

Pinch crushed red pepper flakes (optional)

1 can (14.5 ounces) diced tomatoes, drained

1/4 cup canned, diced mild green chilies

1 teaspoon soy sauce

3 cups hot cooked rice (optional)


Preparation Time: 5 minutes Cook Time: 8 minutes

Preparation: Heat a large skillet or wok over medium-high heat. Add half the oil and heat until smoking, about 10 seconds. Add the onion and stirfry until lightly browned, about 1 minute. Add the pineapple and stir fry gently until pineapple browns lightly, about 1 minute. Remove pineapple to a bowl and set aside. Add remaining oil to the pan. Add shrimp and stir-fry until opaque, about 1 minute. Add garlic and red pepper, if desired, and stir fry for 10 seconds. Add the tomatoes, chilies, and reserved pineapple and stir fry until heated through, about one minute. Stir in soy sauce and serve over rice, if desired.

Tip: We've kept the spiciness light (the canned chilies are mild) and the pinch of crushed pepper flakes is optional. If you want to add a little more heat, increase the pepper. Or for a completely family friendly version, eliminate the red pepper flakes, and your stir-fry will be as mild as a tropical breeze. Serves: Six

#### Safety: Smoke alarms are your best defense Fire is one of the leading causes of accidental

deaths. It's important for everyone to take all preventative measure and precaution possible to be ready to deal with a fire emergency.

More than half of all fatal household fires occur between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. when everyone in the home is usually asleep. A smoke alarm is necessary to alert you to fires when you are asleep. They detect the earliest stages of combustion to allow enough time to evacuate the home safely.

For minimum protection, detectors must be placed between the living areas and the sleeping areas to intercept smoke before it reaches the bedrooms. In multi-storied homes, detectors should be located on the ceilings of stairwells to separate the floor levels. However, the location of the alarm in the vicinity of sleeping areas doesn't provide protection for the occupants from a fire starting in their bedroom. It may be wise to have

additional alarms within each bedroom itself, especially if you smoke.

A closed door can delay the movement of smoke preventing it from reaching a smoke detector, so place alarms in hallways. Fire confined to a large room often develops great intensity before it breaks out. The basement is one area that can be large, removed from the alarm, and isolated. Because basements account for a significant number of fires, it's recommended an alarm be placed above the stairs from the basement.

Detectors should be located on or near the ceiling, away from doors and obstructions. Avoid air currents from doors, windows, fans and vents because turbulent air prevents combustion particles from reaching the alarm. Before installing, read the manufacturer's instructions carefully. Smoke detectors are a small price to pay for a good and safe night's sleep for you and your family!

Gables always seem to make a house more of a home, and this one- or two-bedroom design is no exception. Behind its three-gabled façade, this home contains all the amenities desired by today's discerning family.

A covered entry, providing shelter in inclement weather, leads into a U-shaped foyer where a rail surrounds a stairwell to the unfinished basement included in the plans. A coat closet is located in the stairwell angle, with a secondary bedroom or den to the right.


