





Taking Care of Cordless Tools

ordless screwdrivers and other battery-powered tools are a popular toy for home improvements. Since they are detached from an electrical circuit when they are used, they reduce the chance of electric shock. However, there are still some hazards attached to the use of cordless tools Đ many of them the same as those of other power tools.

Although the cordless tool operates on batteries, it is still recharged by plugging it into an electrical outlet. Here are some safety tips:

- The outlet, the recharging unit and the tool itself should be in good condition before doing so. Never allow the tool or recharging unit to get wet, and do not plug the unit into an outdoor fi xture where it might be exposed to wet weather.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions about how long the battery pack should be left to recharge because both over-charging and undercharging can cause performance problems. Beware of signs of battery damage such as leakage.
- If a tool becomes damaged, remove it from service immediately. It could put you at risk for electrical shock or other injuries.
- For the sake of safety, cordless tools are equipped with triggers that lock in the "off" position. This keeps them from being turned on accidentally. The trigger has to be constantly pushed down for the tool to operate.
- Make sure the screwdriver bit matches the screws you will be using. Do not improvise because a mismatch can cause the bit to slip off the screw



and possibly injure you. When using a cordless drill, use the correct bit for the material you are working with.

Cordless tools can be easier on your hands and arms than heavier powered models. However, you still need to choose tools that are a good fi t for you. For long projects involv-

ing repetitive work, choose cordless tools which are comfortable to hold and do not put pressure on the palm of your hand. The handle of the tool tribute any impact and vibration.

Cordless tools can cause the same kinds of gouges, cuts and scrapes

as power and hand tools. Take special care to keep your off-hand away from the business end of the tool.



Open Up on Short Irons

Ben Hogan had the right attitude on short-iron shots. He said, "I want to be known as the man who hit them the straightest, not the longest."

The 8-iron, 9-iron, and wedges are the control clubs, after all, so there's no point in trying to slug them. I do give these irons a full swing, but I enhance my control with an important change at address. Whereas I address the longer clubs in a square stance - my feet, knees, hips, and shoulders aligned parallel to a line extending from my ball to my target - on the short irons, I open things up a bit. I pull my left foot back a few centimetres from that parallel line, thus rotating my hips, knees, and shoulders a few degrees counter clockwise so that I'm aligned a bit to the left of my target.


This stance facilitates a more upright backswing and a more descending attack on the ball which, on the 8-iron, 9-iron, and wedges, will encourage a straight or softly left- to-right shot with a high, soft trajectory yet lots of backspin on landing.

REDUCING EFFECTS OF ADHD

Most children love video games. They are interactive and fun, but many parents worry how if is affects their child. What if there was a video game that helped encourage better brain function? Well, let us introduce **Neurofeedback.**



What is Neurofeedback for ADHD?

Most children with ADHD have brains scans that reveal too much slow brain activity (Theta) relative to faster brain activity (Beta), especially in the prefrontal cortex (PFC) that helps us pay attention and problem solve. Neurofeedback vs Medication:

Stimulant medications like Ritalin, Concerta or Adderall also speed up brain activity to improve focus and switching attention. The problem with medication is that it affects all areas of the brain, only works while you are taking it, and comes with unwanted side effects like low appetite, irritability, depression, sleep problems, and the potential to be abused.

Neurofeedback by comparison is completely non-invasive. It's just learning! Recent research shows that it is as effective as medication but remains effective even after you stop training because 'once you learn to ride a bicycle, you never forget'. Neurofeedback can improve overall brain function without the negative effects of medications.

If your child is struggling with ADHD, Neurofeedback is an effective alternative. 


